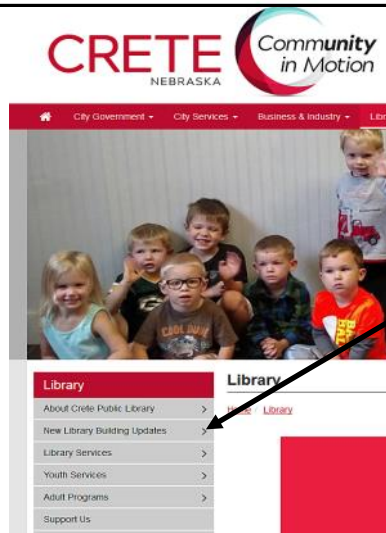

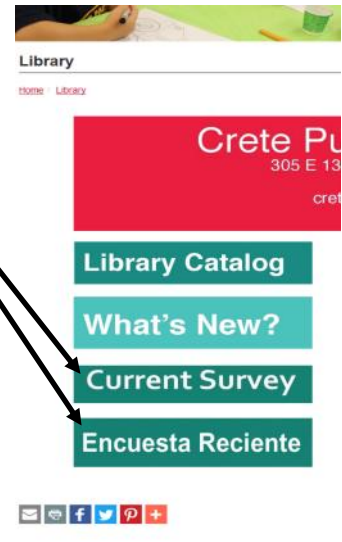

Christmas Reads and Hot Drinks

It's the most wonderful time of the year! 🎵 And we enjoy reading a feel-good story about that most wonderful time of the year, right? With that in mind, let's take a look at recently added titles featuring Christmas.

Once again, Richard Paul Evans offers one of his trademark Christmas stories. *The Noel Diary* has Jacob Churcher returning home after nearly twenty years away. In sorting through his recently deceased mother's belongings, he finds a diary left by a young woman he does not remember, named Noel, who stayed with Jacob's family during her pregnancy. Jacob receives an unexpected visitor, Rachel, searching for the mother who put her up for adoption thirty years ago. United by their quest to find Noel, they also find grace, forgiveness and chance at love.

The Usual Santas by Peter Lovesey is not your typical holiday story. Or in this case, stories. This is a collection of short stories featuring award-winning authors, containing laughs, the most "hardboiled of holiday noir", and heartwarming reminders of the season. Among the stories are: nine mall Santas looking for the imposter among them; an elderly lady seeking peace from her murderously loud neighbors; a young woman receiving a mysterious invitation to Christmas dinner with a stranger; and a story set in a Korean War POW camp. If you are searching for something different and unique, this is the book!

Debbie Macomber, another Christmas favorite, recently released her latest offering, *Merry and Bright*. Merry Bright is so busy with family and work (and keeping out of the crosshairs of her boss) that she has no time for a social life. Her mother and brother create an online dating profile for her, sans photo, and the matches start rolling in. One charming stranger catches her attention and they begin chatting online. Merry discovers through a series of events that her charming stranger is the boss she fastidiously avoids. Still, sometimes the heart can see what our eyes cannot.

An Amish Christmas Love: Four Novellas. The first book *Winter Kisses* by Beth Wiseman, is a story of romance between three generations of women and three generations of men. Book two is *The Christmas Cat* by Amy Clipston, in which Emma learns to appreciate the true meaning of Christmas again. Ellie needs to decide what she will do with her life in the third book *Home For Christmas* by Ruth Reid. The fourth book is *Snow Angels* by Kelly Irvin.

Other new titles include: *Christmas at Little Beach Street Bakery* by Jenny Colgan; *Snowfall on Haven Point* by RaeAnn Thayne; *Because It's Christmas* by Katherine Spencer; *Seven Days of Us* by Francesca Hornak; and *A Snow Country Christmas* by Linda Lael Miller.

A hot drink would go perfectly with all those Christmas reads. Here are two great recipes.

Hot Cocoa Mix

4 c. powdered milk 21.8 oz. box Nestle's Quik
16 oz. instant coffee creamer 1 c. powdered sugar.



Mix all ingredients together and store in airtight container. To make hot cocoa, mix 3-5 big spoons of mix to mug of hot water. Enjoy with marshmallows!

Spiced Chai Latte Mix

3 c. powdered milk 1 1/2 c. sugar
1 c. unsweetened tea mix 3/4 c. instant coffee creamer
1 1/2 tsp. ginger 1/2 tsp. cardamom
1/2 tsp. ground cloves

Mix all ingredients together and store in airtight container. To make, mix 3 Tbsp. of mix in 3/4 c. hot water.



Winter and Our Pets

Winter is starting to rear its ugly head and now that it's here, it's here to stay. This gloomy weather makes daily routines difficult and uncomfortable not only for ourselves, but for our pets as well. I tend to follow the advice put out by the ASPCA about keeping our pets safe during the cold months.

The ASPCA recommends feeding them a little more to help provide the much needed calories to stay warm and be sure they have plenty of water. I wonder if this rule would apply to me as well? Probably not.



A warm bed or dry blanket would fit the bill just fine when it's time to sleep. One last thing to remember, if it's too cold for you, it's too cold for your pet. If you follow these suggestions, you will be able to say or sing, "Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow!"

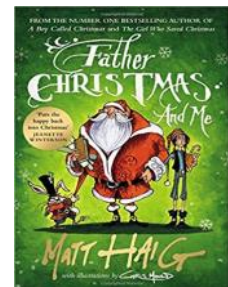
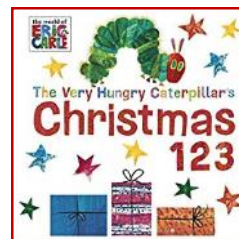
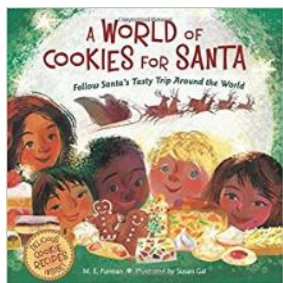
